MESSAGE FROM ROTARY INTERNATIONAL PRESIDENT ELECT

THE 2020-21 PRESIDENTIAL THEME: ROTARY OPENS OPPORTUNITIES



Holger Knaack Rotary International President-elect 20 January 2020

Fourteen years ago, Rotary held its first International Assembly here in San Diego. And I

was sitting right where you are — as a district governor-elect. I was nervous then about the responsibilities ahead of me and the challenges of leadership.

Now, here we are in 2020, at the final International Assembly to be held here in San Diego — and I am still somewhat nervous. The responsibilities are larger for me this time. But so are the possibilities. I am so excited to share with you all the opportunities that lie in front of us.

At home, you are part of a team that works together year to year, making sure that your district's most important work does not end with a new year of leadership, but continues with greater emphasis. I am also part of a team.

I will be proud to continue President Mark Maloney's strong commitment to growing Rotary. However, I will not be asking you to grow by specific numbers, for a very simple reason — every time that we have asked to grow by specific numbers, we have failed. Instead of focusing on numbers, I want you to think about how we can grow Rotary organically and sustainably. How can we keep our current members and win new members who fit our clubs?

Then, how can we make our organization stronger to face the challenges before us? We must rise to this incredible moment – when we are recognized worldwide for our efforts to end polio – and fix our roof while the sun is shining.

In many ways, Rotary is in wonderful shape. We are financially strong. Still. The Rotary Foundation is recognized as one of the world's best charities. Our global grants continue to grow, and we become a more internationally focused organization every year.

We are also evolving in interesting ways. There are now more Asian Rotarians than North American. But there are risks if current trends continue. Especially in areas where we see an aging population, Rotary is declining and over-aged.

We cannot stand still and be satisfied with everything we have done. The digital revolution has affected us much harder than we anticipated. Others have faced this challenge before us and fared poorly.

I had the opportunity to speak recently to Rotarians in Rochester, New York. A former executive at Kodak was in attendance. He told me that they all knew that photography would make the transition to digital eventually. They just never expected it to happen so fast. They went from being the worldwide leader in their field to a company in bankruptcy in just a handful of years.

Time will not slow down for us.

But we will not let rapid change defeat us. We will capture this moment to grow Rotary, making it stronger, more adaptable, and even more aligned with our core values.

In Germany, we see Rotary as a community of shared values and personal integrity. Friendship and networking draw people to Rotary. Because of that, we have strong clubs, from which we generate strength for our service.

The Four-Way Test helps us make objective decisions. It is all about selfreflection. Sometimes you don't even know if what you see with your own eyes is true. But The Four-Way Test allows us to ask ourselves: Am I being honest? And am I doing the right thing? That is important. And if we are being completely honest with ourselves, when we look ahead, do we think Rotary is doing enough to face the challenges of the future?

Rotary has to change and will change. And even if some fellow Rotarians will complain that it does not look like their old Rotary, we have to change. As Paul Harris said, we have to be revolutionary from time to time. And now is the time to be revolutionary. One way that we will do this is by creating new club models and rethinking what it means to be in Rotary. Young people should be the architects of these new clubs.

For many younger people, sitting down for a meal together is not the best way

to meet. Just because we have held meetings this way for over 100 years doesn't mean it is the only way. [My partner] Susanne's club, for example, is a local e-club. They meet online once a week, communicating on a smartphone app, and they meet in person once a month.

Susanne's club ranges in age from 27 to 70. I love this kind of diversity of generations

in our Rotary clubs. That is the ideal – a multi-generation club. Some clubs will succeed in doing this, but only if they meet the needs of younger generations.

We have to be open to new approaches — and creating unique new clubs for younger people is just part of the solution. You have the power to implement them. It will be up to you to make it work. Forming new Rotary clubs is the distinct responsibility of the district governor. Rotary International has already embraced change. Now it is up to you to make these new clubs a reality.

And by the way, one way that we can listen to younger generations and make existing club membership more appealing to them is to focus more on the environment. Recent disasters – such as the bush fires in Australia - underscore the importance of taking strong action. Our last three presidents made a strong case for Rotary doing more to preserve the environment. There is much we can do ourselves – cutting down on our use of plastic, not overly cooling or heating our homes and offices, not driving too fast on the German autobahn. We are already building environmental protection and sustainability into our service projects, but we have to make these issues more of a priority. Younger people are waiting for us to inspire them to action

Young people today enjoy service and want to be active in it. We see this in Rotaract — and Rotaractors are now like us. We are all part of Rotary International. We have done away with the artificial age limit. Let Rotaractors decide what kind of Rotary experience works best for them. And anyone who has worked with Rotaractors knows that these young people are bright, energetic, and they get things done! Rotaractors are faster, more effective, and impatient. Their impatience is a virtue. They want to see results now and they will do the necessary work to get it done right away!

Their impatience and persistence make an impact. Nine years ago, Rotarians had an idea for a new project with the Berlin zoo that, one weekend a year, puts on an amazing show for children that encourages exercise, reading, and healthy eating. While Rotary clubs were still thinking and discussing the project, Rotaractors just decided to start it. And now, all 36 Berlin Rotary and Rotaract clubs take part and make thousands of underprivileged children happy.

So let's take up the challenge and open the doors of Rotary for Rotaractors and young professionals.

But let us also remember that there is no wrong age to become a Rotarian. Every age is welcome; every age has something important to contribute. As we reach out to young Rotarians, we will not leave others behind.

But what about existing clubs? Some parts of the world are already doing a good job with member engagement and retention, while other parts of the world need to do better. To do that, we are going to have to choose new members carefully and ensure that they are the right fit for the right club. We need to make sure that the club meets their expectations. Take it seriously and take your time — you are choosing new friends for life.

We need to stop thinking of new members as people we can mark down as statistics and then forget about. People who leave Rotary talk, and others listen. That affects our image. We want every new Rotarian to be a lifelong Rotarian a friend engaged in Rotary.

Every new member changes us a little bit. That person brings a new perspective, new experiences. We need to embrace this constant renewal. We will grow stronger as we learn from new members and take their experience and knowledge. That's why we need more women in our clubs and more women in leadership positions.

We also need to remember that meeting new people and making sure they enjoy their membership is fun. We enjoy each other's company and have a great time doing whatever we do. We need to embrace these joyous experiences.

The best way for us to have fun is to be together — whether it is at a large gathering like this assembly or the Rotary International Convention, at a service project, or in our regular meetings. And being together makes us more effective.

And it should be no surprise that our vision statement begins with that word. "Together, we see a world where people unite and take action to create lasting change — across the globe, in our communities, and in ourselves."

The vision statement forms the basis for Rotary's new Action Plan, which you will have a critical role in implementing. This new Action Plan is all about growing Rotary and helping us adapt to the digital age. The time is now to take this Action Plan and run with it. Over the next five years, this plan will increase our impact, expand our reach, enhance participant engagement, and increase our ability to adapt.

I would like every Rotary club to have a strategic meeting at least once a year. Each club should be asking where it wants to be in five years and know what value it brings to members.

What makes Rotary so unique and worth sharing with the world? What unique opportunities do we open for you and for the people we serve?

We love people and, wherever we go in the world, Rotarians become our best friends and you wish you had more time with them. We are people from different backgrounds, different generations, languages, and cultures. Even the way that we live Rotary is different country to country and club to club. And that diversity makes us great.

We are held together by the values we share. We are all bound in friendship and we all believe in The Four-Way Test. Rotary is experienced a different way everywhere. But The Four-Way Test remains the same for everyone.

Rotary provides opportunities for service projects that can be performed and completed by us. These projects are meaningful and sustainable. In Rotary, we don't just donate

the money, we also perform the service and see the lasting impact of that service firsthand. This is unique.

Rotary has given many of us the opportunity to travel the world to help put our service ideas into action.

Rotary also provides opportunities for leadership. All of us have taken on great new responsibilities. This is our opportunity to strengthen our network, not for our personal glory, but for the good of Rotary. Creating pathways to leadership for others is a true Rotary ideal — and it will make you a more effective leader.

We are here because we believe in Rotary opportunities, in opportunities for others and for ourselves. We believe that our acts of service, big and small, create opportunities

for people who need our help. We also know that every act of service will inspire and change us.

Here are four stories that illustrate this idea.

Training Leader Christina Covotsou-Patroclou:

My year as a district governor concluded with me filled with a newfound humility

and awe for the service Rotarians in my district provide every year. From an underfunded and forgotten talent school, to the promise of a normal life for children with heart disease or cancer, to the right of clean water in schools, Rotary creates opportunity and gives hope to those who may have none.

Training Leader Ludo Van Helleputte:

I found it in the eyes of a stranger, a connection to the world that I could not find in books. It came from a mother who offered her child to be vaccinated against polio during a National Immunization Day in India. The gratitude in her eyes spoke volumes. Two drops and a smile. ... It changed that child's life, but it also transformed mine. Rotary gave me the opportunity to create lasting change — leading to peace of mind within.

Training Leader Ahmed A. Saada:

At 28, Rotary gave me the opportunity to participate in a Group Study Exchange program. There, I met a professor who offered me a scholarship at Johns Hopkins University, where I could enhance my clinical research skills and earn a PhD. When I returned home, I was asked to join Rotary — and a new world of service opened for me. For the past 26 years, I have taken every opportunity to volunteer on medical convoys. But my greatest Rotary opportunity happened when I was a Rotaractor — that's where I met my wife and the love of my life, Rania!

Training Leader Mary B. Berge:

I was adopted at birth, raised in a small family of four. In high school, I hid in a bathroom stall many days, afraid to face the bullies. For years, I was content to follow, never realizing my untapped potential within. Rotary gave me the opportunity to be a citizen of the world, to lead, and to stand on this stage, with confidence and strength. What opportunities does Rotary have for me next? I don't know, but because of Rotary, I'm ready.

So as you can see, Rotary is not just a club that you join. It is an invitation to endless opportunities. It opens opportunities to serve in a project as big and historic as End Polio Now and also in a small community project, where you just plant a tree.

And it opens opportunities for you to live a richer, more meaningful life, with friends around the world, based on our core values.

As Rotarians, we are very blessed to take on leadership roles at this wonderful moment for our organization.

Everything we do opens another opportunity for someone, somewhere. Therefore, the theme for our year is: Rotary Opens Opportunities.

the Outgoing Treasurer

I n a club the size of the Rotary Club of Muyenga the treasurer's work can be very demanding and challenging but with goodwill all round, a keen eye on the resource envelope at all times and a cool head nothing is impossible.

With regards to the resource envelope, the incoming treasurer would do well to keep the basic fundamentals of the club not far from his breast pocket. During 2019/20 our membership dues were set at US\$200. From this is deducted US\$93 for Rotary International (RI), Country dues US\$16, and district dues US\$16. This leaves US\$75 to manage club affairs. If you assume a membership of say 110 that leaves US\$8250 (say UGX30 million or UGX 2.5 million per month) for club day to day activities. From this you will have to manage club administrative expenses- printing stationery, communication costs, retreats and training, audit fees; club function expenses like family of Rotary and Rotary extension programs and public relations programmes and youth and vocational expenses for our rotarators and interactors.



You will find that managing all this on UGX2.5million per month is very tight. It will be necessary to play the Sergeant at Arms (SAA) card very hard. Make sure that

the SAA basket does the rounds every fellowship by working through the buddy groups and in particular the buddy group leader. Weaving the SAA basket through fellowship should yield some dividends and enable the treasurer to balance the club budget.

As for goodwill I would like to thank the club president Douglas Kabenge for giving me this opportunity to serve and I must comment that president Doug, busy man as he is, has always been ready to drop everything he is doing at any particular time to listen to the treasurer's issues. Thank you, president Doug, as well as the very hard working and diligent board of directors who have always given the treasurer their utmost cooperation and advice.

To the incoming treasurer Nobert please do not hesitate to ask for any help or advice if and when you need, it but in the meantime, my very best wishes for a successful 2020/21.

The Rotary Foundation

At the 1917 convention, outgoing Rotary president Arch Klumph proposed setting up an endowment fund for the purpose of "doing good to the world". That one idea and an initial contribution of \$26.50, has transformed million of lives around the globe.

This led to the birth of The Rotary Foundation, a public charity operated exclusively for charitable purposes .It is governed by a Board of Trustees

When you give to The Rotary Foundation, you support Rotary's work across the world and help ensure our future

The Rotary Foundation transforms your gifts into service projects that change lives both close to home and around the world.

These gifts can be channelled to any of the three funds, namely; Annual Fund, Endowment fund and Polio Plus



The Annual Fund

The Annual Fund is the primary source of funds that support the rotary foundation programs and areas of focus.

The Annual Fund contributions are invested for three years to generate earnings to meet the Foundation's operating expenses.

The Endowment Fund

Endowment fund's objective is to provide a permanent and sustainable source of funding.

Contributions to the Endowment fund are invested in perpetuity and investment earnings are used to provide a permanent source of income to the Foundation's programs.

Polio Plus Fund is used for the effort to end polio. It is invested in only fixed income securities (i.e. bonds) because of the need to protect and preserve the fund.

Foundation funding

Through the SHARE system, contributions to The Rotary Foundation are transformed into grants that fund local and international humanitarian projects, scholarships, and activities such as vocational training teams

At the end of every rotary year, contributions directed to the Annual Fund-SHARE from all Rotary clubs in the district are divided between World Fund and District Designated Fund or DDF.

At the end of three years your district can use DDF to pay for Foundation, club and district projects that your club and others in the district choose. Districts may use up to half of the DDF to fund district grants. The remaining DDF may be used for global grants or donate to Polio Plus, the Rotary Peace Centers or another district

District officials are encouraged to monitor their DDF availability and activity by viewing the SHARE Contribution Detail Report and Available DDF by District Report via their My Rotary account

World Fund

The World fund provides funding for our highest priolity activities around the globe.

While 50% of SHARE designated contributions are applied to the World Fund, you can also direct your entire gift to the fund.

The Foundation uses the money to pay for grants and opportunities available to all rotary districts In 2018 Fiscal year, The Foundation awarded \$86,677,399 in funding 1,306 grants.

HOW TO WIN A JOB INTERVIEW

Clear wisdom is mandatory from us all towards our beloved youth in the struggle to transform their livelihoods for sustainable development. The Month of September is increasingly a Rotary dedication to the youth the world over.

When you are shortlisted for a job interview in today's competitive job market, always remember to be armed rightly as follows:

- **Keep time.** Some companies use time management reports as part of the interview score card. Be there in good time and immediately you arrive register with the designated officer.
- **Be smart.** Always remember to dress decently. For a man always remember to put on a jacket and neck tie, for a woman look out for a decent office dress and put on. Always remember that first impression is lasting impression and so, can win or deny you a job.
- Be clean. Wash well, trim your hair so well, brush your shoes well, iron well, brush your teeth well and if possible have some mild spray on your body. Some people are too dirty and untidy and this problem alone can make you lose an interview at first glance. Nobody is interested in associating with a disorganized person starting from the way he/she looks.
- **Keep around.** Don't loiter around places. Stick to the venue where you are designated to sit or wait for instructions. Some waiting rooms have readable materials; keep yourself busy reading until you are called to face the panel. Remember that someone or some system may be monitoring you and your patience levels for consideration in your final interview score.
- When called for interviews, always knock the door first before you are



allowed to enter the interview room. Never sit down before you are shown where to sit by the ushering officer or Panel chair.

- When you sit down, wait for instructions from the chair, don't start any discussion or debate before you greet the chair and the panel as a whole.
- Always listen to the instructions or questions put to you carefully before you answer. Never answer a question when an interviewer is still asking. Always ask for clarifications and repeats where you don't get the question right but don't over ask; this situation always badly irritates the panel.
- In answering questions, always avoid big words. Use clear, simple, specific relevant examples and words to explain yourself.
- Never tell lies to the panel. Speak out what you know very well and what you don't know always show the panel that you are eager and very willing to learn. The Panel is made up of well knowledgeable persons about the subject matter and so, if you tell lies you will be automatically disqualifying yourself.
- **Speak well.** Don't change your accent to speak like an American, British and so on. Remember that you are a Ugandan made English speaking person and not at all a white person as some people may wish to behave in many times.

- **Understand your CV very well** because it is always the first question to be asked in an interview, to describe yourself.
- Be ready for any form of interview. Some companies now days use action oriented interviews to capture skills instantly than the traditional desk interviews of question and answer approach.
- When asked to talk about the appropriate Monthly salary you may require, always refer this question back to the panel to determine it based on their financial plan and work load for the post. This is because you are looking for a job and not money at this time. Money issues come in later when you have been successfully placed.
- When asked when you will be available to start work, never say now. Give the Panel atleast a week or two to wind up your past endeavors and to resort to theirs without any interruption. This shows great faithfulness, commitment and good organisation in a person every employer is looking for.
- Always be steady, don't shy, don't fear and look straight into the eyes of the interviewer as you answer his/her questions.
- Don't forget to ask the panel the appropriate time established to communicate feed back to you after the interviews; it's very important to prepare your mind for change and for new work if any.
- FINALLY, always remember that an interview panel is not a Court session designed to prosecute and sentence you to prison. It's merely a committee of different professionals brought together as a team to identify a super star or change agent suitable for that post in question. Therefore, always be confident and well prepared before it, don't fear but rather respect it at all times because it makes the final decision for employment destiny.

Understanding the Impact of Corona Virus

Since December 2019, the Global Economy has been on tenterhooks, resulting from the outbreak of Covid-19, the fatally viral infection caused by Corona Virus. As we all know, this infection started in Wuhan, a remote city in China. A number of conspiracy theories have been advanced to explain the outbreak, but this is not the time to engage in such speculations. As I pen this article, the global death toll from Corona Virus has reached 50,395!!!And over 1,000,000 infected cases with epicenters in Italy in Europe and New York in the United States of America. Interestingly, China is experiencing dramatic recovery!

The health sector in all countries including Uganda has therefore been stretched beyond their capabilities and must be commended for selflessness as they treat the overwhelming number of patients. The pertinent questions for every head of state, government and economists are;1)Has Corona virus plunged our countries into a recession? 2) Who are the most economically affected people? 3) Which sectors of the economy have been hit hardest? 4) What is the most viable response from government? 5) How did different governments respond to similar global crises such as the world

global financial crisis? 6) What immediate safety nets can the government put in place to mitigate such devastating impacts of the Coronavirus? 7) What lessons have we learnt though in a hard way from coronavirus pandemic?

1) Has COVID-19 pandemic plunged Ugandan Economy in recession?

The answer is technically No, but practically a big Yes. For a recession to be declared, an economy must have contracted for two successive guarters, which has not happened of recent, at least from available data. Therefore, a myopic person can take refuge in these technical narratives, but the reality is selfrevealing: there has been closure of businesses: unemployment surge: failure for many borrowers to meet loan obligations; tax defaults; failure for tax body to meet targets and a general fall in consumer demand. The struggling lower income population has reached tipping point where they are unable to pay rent; meet utility bills and are calling for relief supplies from government. When you reach such a threshold, you do not wait for technical definitions to define economics realities.

2) Who are the most economically affected people?

The coronavirus has hit every one but it has devastated informal sector operatives, wage earners and those in the tourism sector. The latter are hit hardest because corona virus is foreign linked. In Uganda, it has been proved that most infected persons had travelled from Dubai, United Kingdom and other countries. Tourism will suffer for some time from low external demand. largely due to depressed global economy which will affect hotel industry and similar services. On the other hand, the informal sector economy (boda bodas,

small retail business) will agonize due to abrupt closures but this is temporary. Once the corona virus pandemic is subdued, this sector will pick immediately. The suffering within this sector is therefore shortlived

3) Which sectors have been hit hardest and what are the macroeconomic implications?

As already explained in the foregoing, the tourism sector has been hit hardest because this sector depends entirely on extend demand, yet the corona virus epicenter is in countries which constitute the very source of financial flows including US\$ 1.8 Billion from Ugandan Diaspora (BOU, 2019). The contraction in inflows will lead to volatility in the domestic foreign exchange market, hence negatively affecting our current account and Balance of Payments. The other sector to be hard hit will be the financial/ banking sector, largely resulting from reduced appetite for loans due to collapsing business enterprises. There will be loan repayment defaults with subsequent surge in Non-Performing Loans (NPL). This will further contract the economy due to decline in aggregate demand, dearth of economic activity and contraction of private sector credit all resulting into general poor economic health.

4) What is the most viable response from government?

The response needs different targeted policies because the corona pandemic has significant economic fallout, reflecting shocks to supply and demand. There is need to support the economy through the pandemic, keeping a web of economic and financial relationship between the workers and employers; suppliers and consumers. The aim is to prevent a health crisis turning into an economic and financial debacle, which can permanently harm people and firms through jobs losses and bankruptcies. The following fiscal actions from the supply side are pertinent;

- The first priority is to keep people healthy and as safe as possible. This means spending more on health supplies and equipment in hospitals and other health facilities
- Ensure food supplies to the most vulnerable
- Quantitative easing to business enterprises aimed at preventing total collapse of business activity.
- Intervening in Loan renegotiations to support borrowers to manage their loan obligations
- Supporting tenants to renegotiate with their landlords for rescheduling on rental charges.
- Direct cash payments to vulnerable people especially the elderly.

On the demand side, there is need for appropriate monetary policy. The first is for reduction of interest rates. The Bank of Uganda has correctly responded by reducing the Central Bank Rate (CBR) by 0.5% although previous experience has shown that the CBR is not a sufficient monetary policy transmission mechanism in this regard. Therefore, there is need to invoke other monetary policy transmission tools aimed at stimulating demand and economic activity in the short and medium term. This is even what the FED in the United States has already done, reducing interest rate by 50 basis points. There is need to defer tax payments and expedite tax rebates to business enterprises where possible. Others are; defer utility bill payments.

5) How did different foreign governments respond to similar cases such as the global financial crisis?

The global financial crisis was different from the corona pandemic because the latter, though has significantly affected the financial system, came outside the financial system itself. In this case, it will be relatively easier to deal with. What government needs to do is to provide adequate quantitative easing to help cushion business enterprises from total collapse and bankruptcy. This is crucial because all other interventions depend on the capacity to government to finance the initiatives under the stimulus package but also it is from vibrant business enterprises that government will be able to get revenue. The Obama administration in the United States (2008) provided the mother of all stimuli to American business enterprises and this prompt response alone averted the entire global financial crisis which otherwise could have plunged the American economy into a depression. The banks and insurance companies were rescued and America was back on rail.

6) Are there safety nets Uganda can put in place to mitigate the impact of such crises?

- There is need for strategic food reserves. This is crucial in contingency situation such as the current need for food stuffs by people who have been rendered jobless due to closure of business and general lockdown.
- Need for improved foreign exchange reserves position. Currently, our foreign exchange reserve position is equivalent to 4 1/2 months import value. This is reasonable in normal circumstances but in a situation like of corona virus pandemic, it can be a drop in the ocean.
- In the medium and long term, there is urgent need for enhancing export sector performance and support for any activity aimed at improving financial flows including establishing diaspora bonds.

7) Are there lessons that we can learn from corona virus pandemic?

• That an economy cannot sustainably depend on external

demand and supply. This is because both are adversely affected by the depressed global economy. Tourism can abruptly halt while foreign manufactured goods can be in short supply or out of reach due to astronomic rise in prices.

- Adoption of digitalization such as internet banking, mobile money transactions, and automation in industry production are all opportunities that enhance productivity, efficiency and profitability.
- Education institutions should exploit the prevailing digital applications as bulwark for Business
- Continuity Planning (BCP). This entails online teaching and financial transactions in order to keep business operations.
- It is better to develop our internal capacity to manage pandemics, have ICUs and improve quality of health care in the country. Also public health behaviour such as hand washing should continue even after the corona virus.
- Biosecurity has also been vindicated as one critical area that needs attention and mainstreaming

Whether conspiracy or not, the corona virus pandemic is here, we need to support government to eliminate the spread of the infection.
